Local History Room

No newsletters were published in 2020 because of the pandemic. As a result of this, an important aspect of 2019 was never reported. That year marked Oradell's 125th anniversary, and as part of the celebration and recognition of that event, all Oradell residents who had lived in Oradell for at least seventy years, were asked to participate in small group interviews.

Mr. Carter, the Borough Historian, led the discussions. A total of three group sessions were held, all of which were filmed and recorded by the Oradell Public Television (OPTV) group. DVDs of the meetings are now part of the Local History Collection.

The remembrances were so interesting that OPTV broadcast the interview sessions sporadically over Channel 77 for Optimum users and Channel 28 for Verizon users.

Despite the pandemic, the activities of the Local History Room did not come to a standstill. Many things changed in Oradell—parking lots were empty, schools were closed, playgrounds unused, etc. All this was captured by the Borough Historian in a photographic journal of some 65 pages, which can be viewed in the Local History Room.




In addition, a major hurricane passed through Oradell, leaving devastation and a mess in its wake. This was also captured and preserved in booklet form for future reference.

At the same time, the Suez Water Co. was changing pipes in a number of streets because of a lead elbow that was used to connect the house to the main water pipe in the street. In a couple of cases, rather unusual difficulties occurred, and this was also documented in booklet form.

And the pandemic did not slow down the contributions to the history collection. A prior officer of the Oradell Book and Needle Club donated her collection of memorabilia, which included several years of club minutes, along with numerous photographs.

This generous gift inspired another member to deliver a large amount of material, also very valuable for the collection. As a result of these and previous donations, the History Room has every Book and Needle Yearbook since the club's inception, missing only the years 1918 and 1921. In addition, the History



In 1984, President Ronald Reagan visited River Dell Senior High School, and the Oradell Archives contain many pictures of that event. However, just this last year, a picture of the President congratulating the Oradell Police Chief, Bill Ennis, came to light and was gifted to the History Collection.

In the fall of 2020, the Local History Room received a

marvelous gift from the grand-nephew of Oradell author, Percy Keese Fitzhugh. Mr. Fitzhugh wrote over 100 books, most dealing with the Boy Scouts. His biographer has stated that Mr. Fitzhugh was very instrumental in helping the national organization of Boy Scouts get going, his books spurring on the interest in scouting.

The Fitzhugh donation included 86 books, three volumes of photographs, and family history going back several hundred years. The donated material took up so much space that a new bookcase was purchased just to house it. In addition to numerous correspondence, particularly from publishers, were three unpublished manuscripts, a book printed in Braille, and one translated into German.

New Services ... New changes...

When you come to the Library to pick up and check out materials, you must present your valid library card at the circulation desks. For those who prefer contactless checkout, self-checkout is available now at the library. A meeScan station is located to the right of the circulation desk on the main floor. It's easy, safe and secure. Easy step-by-step directions are posted at the site. You can also use the free meeScan mobile app on your phone to check out books anywhere in the library.

Oradell Library is currently offering access to Brainfuse HelpNow. This is an online learning tool that provides free, live, online expert tutoring for all ages. It also offers academic and standardized test prep, college application assistance, resume review, expert writing guidance, foreign language lab, online lessons, videos and so much more. Go to the library's website at https://oradell.bccls.org/, where you can find a link to BrainFuse and a link to a tutorial.

Currently, Oradell Library offers two genealogical databases to assist you in discovering your family history. Heritage Quest Online, is a database available through NJ State Library. It is accessible with your library card barcode number at either BCCLS' website (www.bccls.org) or Oradell Library's website (https://oradell.bccls.org/). In addition, Oradell Library continues to offer Ancestry.com with at home access. The remote access link can be found at Oradell Library's website. Speaking of databases, another NJ State Library database had a name change. The database, Reference USA is now called Reference Solutions. Reference Solutions is a leading online source for business and residential data in the United States. It helps users of all kinds search for jobs, research U.S. businesses, create marketing and small business plans, locate specific people and more. You can find two free recorded seminars on the benefits of Reference Solutions on Oradell Library's website. One of the seminars highlights the features of its business section and the other seminar highlights its jobs and internship section.

Since December 28, 2020, BCCLS' collection of digital magazines have moved and can be found now at Overdrive and the Libby App. You can access over 500 magazines such as Us Weekly, Good Housekeeping and Newsweek as well as thousands of eBooks and eAudiobooks in the convenient Overdrive platform or digital app! Enjoy them on your computer or portable device. All you need is your BCCLS (Oradell) library card.

Not only does Oradell Library lend out a fantastic collection of books, dvds, cds and gives access to an awesome digital collection but also lends out Hotspots, museum passes, a variety of jigsaw puzzles and bakeware (such as candy molds, cookie cutters, bake pans and more).
