In the Summer Newsletter, I wrote about the loss of two ladies from Oradell, and how their families wanted them to be remembered by requesting memorial donations toward the purchase of items for the Youth Department.

That has been done, and the new work stations with computers, and club chairs with electrical and USB outlets, have been installed.

Local History Room

This has been an intolerably muggy year, and you have already learned that our Borough Hall has been shut down because of a mold problem. The Local History Room has suffered also, and mold has been found on some of our prized books in the collection. It has appeared only on cloth covered books, but, of course, we have many of these.

When this was discovered, the Borough immediately authorized remedial action, which included, installing a new dehumidifier, authorizing funds to have the books specially treated, providing equipment to vacuum the entire room using special vacuum filters, and leaving the lights on 24/7 because mold doesn't like light.

All the affected books and binders have been removed from the shelves and cleaned with a antimicrobial solution. They were then packed for shipment to a facility in Allentown, PA, where they will be again shipped to an atomic facility to be treated with gamma rays. These rays will penetrate the book completely, killing any mold encountered, either in the covers or on the interior pages. The books will then be returned to a room that has hopefully been cleaned of any residual mold.. Of course, having a collection in a basement area makes it kind of hard to rid the area of mold, and the humidity that helps it grow.

I am especially grateful for the speed with which the Borough responded with help, and the funds to have the books treated.

Information Services Librarian

For the past two years, as a library representative, I have proudly serviced on Oradell's Stigma Free Task Force Committee. This committee, which is listed on the Borough's website, aims to reduce the stigma associated with mental illness, raise awareness that mental illness is a disease, and help create a culture where residents feel supported and free to seek support and treatment without fear of stigma.

The Committee's first event was held at the library back in January of 2017. Jill A. Pantaleo, LCSW spoke about the causes, symptoms, and treatment recommendations of anxiety.

Since then, the committee with much support from member and Mayor Dianne Didio and Stigma Free Ambassador Julia Orlando, has sponsored or co-sponsored a variety of activities to raise awareness and reduce the stigma associated with mental illness. For example, you may have seen lime green (the color for Stigma Free) ribbons posted around town, noticed the Stigma Free banner, viewed a library display, participated in a Mental Health First Aid Training course, or attended a Stigma Free event or program. During 2018, the committee organized several Stigma Free themed high school sports events. In addition, the group sponsored a program at River Dell High School in which Kim Agresta, MSW, LCSW spoke about the effects of social media and technology on our children. During the summer, the Committee co-sponsored the town's movie night which featured the family film, Inside Out. September, the committee held an Open House at the Library in which the community was invited to meet members and learn more about the committee.

On Thursday, October 18, at 7 pm at the River Edge Public Library, the Oradell Stigma Free Committee and the River Edge Stigma Free Initiative will co-sponsor a book discussion. Psychologist Dr. Joel Ingersoll, founder and president of Take on College will moderate the book discussion of What Made Maddy Run: The Secret Struggles and Tragic Death of an All American Teen by Kate Fagan. This program is open to all so please join us. A limited number of free copies of the book are available for residents who register for the discussion at either River Edge or Oradell libraries. Books were generously donated by River Edge PBA Local 201, River Edge Volunteer Fire Department and River Edge Volunteer Ambulance Service. Copies of the book are also available for borrowing through BCCLS libraries with a library card.



The Friends of the Library

In January 2014 we started a movie discussion group, the IFC Film Club, at the Oradell Public Library. IFC stands for Independent, Foreign, and Classic. We debated for a few years, but finally took the plunge— and tried it. It was (and still is) a great success. Our first offering was *Chinatown* (1974), chosen because of its classic status and perfectly developed plot twists, provoking much discussion. We evaluate our success by the discussion. Hopefully, someone will not like the movie and that adds to the flavor of the discussion and further interest. Members of the IFC Film Club make suggestions and help choose the films to be discussed. We do not shy away from controversial films; in fact, we welcome them.

A few months after the first session, the suggestion was *Klute* (1972), as a friend, Tibor Sands, was the assistant cameraman on the movie. Tibor Sands joined us for dinner before the meeting and contributed so much background information that added more to the discussion. We had another guest that night, Robert Milli of Harrington Park, the actor who played the

murdered man, whose disappearance got the action of the story started and created the suspense. Robert Milli became a regular member of the IFC Film Club and also a frequent presenter of dramatic readings at the library. He has presented Charles Dickens, Hamlet, James Joyce, and has generously donated his collection of films on DVD, many Film Noir, to our collection. We share the offerings in this Robert Milli Collection with other patrons of the Bergen County Cooperative Library System (BCCLS) communities.

He also has a long history in movies, theater and television. Watch for his upcoming performances at our Library and Felician University in Rutherford, N. J.

All of these wonderful evenings came about because of the creative interests of our library community, with the support and encouragement of John J. Trause, our Library Director, as well as the financial organizational support of the Friends of the Library.
